More About Community-Based Mental Health & Clinical Programs

The Help Group Child and Family Center, since 1985, is one of the largest providers of mental health services for children in Los Angeles County. Funded through the Department of Mental Health and the Department of Children and Family Services, these at risk, under resourced youth, ages birth through adolescence, have experienced family or communitybased trauma.

With a multi-disciplinary team consisting of therapists, care managers, psychiatrists and community based mental health workers, family focused, child centered services are delivered to more than 600 youth in our clinics or in family homes each week, providing help and hope to those who need us most.


We thank the Ahmanson Foundation for helping to promote the health and well-being of our students and for creating a more positive school life through outdoor play for some of our youngest learners.

Innovating with STEM Technology

With initial grant funding from the W.M. Keck Foundation, The Help Group launched its STEM³ Academy in 2014. Now, with newer technologies and a strengthened STEM educational platform thanks to a generous grant from the Rose Hills Foundation, The Help Group's Summit View, Village Glen and Westview Schools, were able to launch the new 2023-24 academic year with more robust STEM program offerings.

These WASC accredited, college preparatory program students are benefiting from access to educational technologies designed to boost engagement and motivation. Microrobotics is promoting coding and Minecraft Education is supporting immersive STEM learning through play. A fully-equipped, all new Gaming Lab designed for E-sports, is giving students the chance to participate in California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) E-Sports competitions with other students from across the country. The addition of VEX robotics has been a gateway for our students to enter, compete and win regional competitions. Drone technology is encouraging teamwork and collaboration to problem-solve drone navigation, flight and automation.

Creating Camp Experiences

Summer camp is such an important and enriching experience for typical youth, let alone young people with special needs who are often not able to participate in a classic camp environment. Through a generous gift from Caroline Bruder and Mark Santarsiero, Kids Like Me Camp Scholarships were made available to many of our young people who might not otherwise have had the financial means to attend. By providing a welcome place for them to meet new friends, campers were able to learn new skills and create new memories. Building a Hub of Enrichment Opportunities

The Help Group is pleased to announce that a new Enrichment Center is under development on its Sherman Oaks Campus. This

re-designed and re-purposed enrichment space is set to open this spring and will include a large motor-sensory room, music and dance space, a fitness room as well as an adjacent outdoor track and field with exercise and gym equipment, a daily living skills lab, a vocational lab and an art studio. Securing Brighter Futures

For more than 14 years, Looking Beyond has supported The Help Group's Sunrise School, dedicated to serving young people with autism and other developmental disorders on its Sherman Oaks and Culver City Campuses. Fostering a Sense of **Belonging at Camp**

This past summer, more than 100 neurodiverse six to seventeen-year-olds with autism spectrum disorder and other special needs attended our Kids Like Me Summer Camp. Each day was filled with fun and engaging recreational activities designed to encourage skill development, social interaction and to foster a sense of belonging. Campers were matched with like peers, allowing them to participate in activities tailored to meet their unique needs.

Navigating camp can be a struggle for individuals facing communication challenges, especially those with autism and ADHD. This was the case for nine-year old Alison, prior to attending Kids Like Me. From day one, our highly trained staff worked with Alison to form lunchtime groups with peers, initiate imaginative play and facilitate conversations of interest between her and other campers. According to her father, "Alison was eagerly looking forward to camp each day and making plans for playdates - the change was remarkable." Our campers, including Alison, ended the summer counting the days until Spring Camp 2024!

Building Friendships Through Best Buddies

The Help Group is proud to partner with Best Buddies International, Los Angeles Chapter, dedicated to creating opportunities for meaningful one-to-one friendships for youth with and without special needs.

Launched during the pandemic, classrooms at Bridgeport High School began participating in virtual visits with students at The Buckley School and established a new Best Buddies chapter together, with the goal of creating an inclusive, encouraging and friendly space.

Ensuring Gains for All Young Learners

Our Young Learners Early Education program for preschool students with autism is expanding. Its comprehensive whole child approach to early education is centered around the belief that every child has the potential to learn, grow, and connect, and offers an intensive six-hour per day program five days a week with supportive services incorporated into the school day. One of the cornerstones of our program is the use of Naturalistic Developmental Behavioral Intervention and Speech and Language therapy, provided in a collaborative model within the classroom setting, as well as tailored play-based activities to suit each child's specific needs, ensuring that they thrive at their own pace.

One of the students who is thriving at Young Learners is Jason. "He's excited to go to school now," says his mother Michelin. Each morning, Jason says goodbye to her with a kiss and heads to class, where he enjoys spending time with classmates and teachers. Jason is actively engaged riding bikes with his peers, completing puzzle sets, and making handprints in art. With a visual schedule, daily classroom routines and integrated therapeutic care, Jason is transitioning well into our Young Learners program and making great progress on his speech, communication and comprehension. Jason's successes underscore the importance of building foundational skill sets to make those pivotal early leaps.



STEM³ Academy Alum Breaking **Barriers**

In the first episode of our series "Breaking Barriers," Zach, a STEM³ Academy alum, credits his exposure to STEM academics and the specialized approach to instruction he received as key to his success. After graduating from The Help Group's STEM³ Academy in 2019, Zach attended the University of California at Davis, where he earned his BS in Environmental Science & Management, and is now a first year student at USC's Gould School of Law.

"At STEM, the biggest things I learned were how to study, how to do well and how to persevere," says Zach. "My teachers all pushed me, and told me, you can do more."

Zach's academic accomplishments and his commitment to personal growth are an example of what can be achieved when determination meets opportunity.

Building Life Skills Through Coaching

Many of our Life Skills coaching clients at Advance LA are successfully attending college, earning top grades and improving their executive functioning skills with the assistance of trained and compassionate coaches. Others are reaching their goal of independent adulthood by obtaining and maintaining employment, learning how to drive or access public transportation, as well as increasing their social circles. Our club I.a. offers monthly social events for young adults enjoying a wide array of activities. And our parent support group, which meets twice monthly, is a wonderful way for parents to exchange resources and share experiences.

Helping to pave the way, Coach Don, one of our life skill coaches, has been guiding and supporting a young man named Robert for several years. After graduating college at 22, Robert remained unemployed and filled his days playing video games in his room. At the outset, Don assisted Robert in initiating a workout regimen and they started meeting regularly at the gym. Additionally, Don aided Robert in crafting a resume and honing his interview skills. After Robert landed a full time job at a law firm where he now works as a file clerk, he was incredibly proud of his achievements and his parents were amazed by his progress. Robert has held his job for over a year and continues to work with Coach Don on health and wellness as well as essential life skills. Failure to launch, for Robert and other young people like him can be transformed into learning to thrive.

Summit View Alum Spearheads **E-sports Gaming Initiative**

With her unique blend of talent and warmth, we're thrilled to have Summit View alum, Caroline O'Neill return as part of The Help Group staff as she spearheads our E-sports gaming program.

Caroline is grateful to pay it forward. As a teen, she found it difficult to connect with others. However, in the supportive community Caroline discovered at Summit View, coupled with the small class environment, she was able to focus and thrive academically and socially. Now, as a teacher's aide at Westview, her commitment revolves around instilling new skills in students and uncovering their hidden talents, making her a vital asset to our

educational programs.

Bringing her knowledge and love of E-sports back to The Help Group, Caroline has been integral in helping to develop a CIF E-sports program housed within the new, state-of-the-art gaming center at the Culver City campus. Caroline's involvement in E-Sports, a passion she grew up with, took center stage during her college years at Marymount California University, where she earned a scholarship as captain of the E-Sports team. She believes that participating in competitive video gaming provides young people with valuable team-based skill sets that foster collaboration and communication. One of her students shared, "I get to participate in my school's E-sports CIF games, meet with students from across the US and play at the same level of legitimacy as all the other organized sports."

We are confident Caroline will have a meaningful impact on the growth and success of students in our school community.

STEM Robotics Team Places top 10 in California

The STEM³ Academy robotics team placed top 10 in California and top 115 in the World at the Vex IQ Robotics Challenge. The team, Octon proudly won 1st and 2nd place in the first two challenge matches and won all possible categories, including Skills, Team Work and Judges Awards in their most recent match. After taking home consecutive wins in the regional North Los Angeles League, they will be advancing to the California State Championships this coming March.

Presented by the Robotics Education & Competition Foundation, The Help Group's team, were competing against neurotypical young people from schools across Los Angeles. It was a victory very well deserved and an opportunity to foster greater understanding and acceptance among neurotypical students and the broader community about the capabilities of neurodiverse students. A win all around - a boost in the confidence of our students showcasing that when given the right supports, everyone can excel.

Beyond the competition, involvement in robotics among our students encourages personal and inter-personal skills including communication, creativity and empathy. Our students are learning that key life skills, such as developing friendships, defending reasoned beliefs, and working with peers and team mates, are just as important to success as knowledge and facts. At The Help Group, STEM students enthusiastically use their natural abilities to learn coding, 3D modeling and builder and maker skills, and explore and test solutions through exciting, hands-on projects. Our STEM curriculum is designed to cultivate collaboration, social and emotional skills, thinking skills and creativity in special learners. The STEM program prides itself on its development of its state of the art innovation lab filled with opportunities to explore and create, preparing students for 21st century careers.

REACHing Full Circle with Our Families

Breaking generational cycles of trauma is at the heart of our mental health efforts. As a teen, Gabriela accessed our mental health programs and as a mother of four now, 15 years later, knowing she needed parental supports, she turned to The Help Group to access our REACH After-School and Comprehensive Mental Health Programs.

Funded by L.A. County Department of Mental Health, REACH therapists work hand-in-hand with caregivers providing family therapy and parent training and support groups with the goal of assisting families in promoting positive relationships with their children. Our therapeutic family therapy sessions are helping Gabriela to cultivate healthy, loving relationships. The Help Group provides Therapeutic Behavioral Services to Gabriela's entire family in their home.

At Bridgeport Vocational Center, the challenges of transitioning from high school to the next phase, particularly for students with social and learning difficulties, is immense. Central to the educational model is Career Technical Education, designed for students to take part in valuable job experiences, internships, certifications, and more. Through partnerships with Los Angeles Valley College and West Los Angeles College, students can enroll, earn certifications, and secure job placements in one of six CTE academies: Agriculture, Arts & Media, Construction and Manufacturing, Education-Child Development, Fashion Design, and Hospitality & Tourism. The program is designed to empower young adults and provide them with 21st century employability soft skills. Valuable to this experience, students are learning inter-personal and work-place skills with the goal of preparing them for greater independence in work and in life.

We congratulate Benajmin, Eric, Brenner, Matthew and Citlali, our first students to receive Career Technical Education (CTE) certificates from West Los Angeles College.

Creating Community Employment Opportunities for Our Transition age Students

Since 1993, The Help Group WorkAbility program, through the CA Department of Education, has provided vocational assessments to more than 500 students annually.

Reducing drop-out rates and promoting early vocation exploration, The Help Group We Can Work programs facilitated paid work experience and training workshops for over 120 students in 2023. Youth, ages 16 to 22, are gaining and refining employment skills with up to 100 hours of supervised job training on-and-off campus with major retail stores like, Target, Old Navy, Staples, Smart & Final, Sharky's, Walgreens and more. With the aim of enhancing the quality of life for individuals and fostering inclusive and equitable communities, The Help Group has long offered these kinds of employment programs through the California Department of Rehabilitation.

Bridging the service cliff when students age out of school, The Help Group Adult Work Experience program for young adults in the community offers paid internships prior to entering the competitive workforce. These employment services, funded by both the Department of Rehabilitation and the Department of Mental Health, aim to assist adults with special needs in obtaining and maintaining competitive employment in the community.

Learning Valuable Vocational Skills Beyond the Classroom

Bridgeport Vocational Education Program is now serving 115 young people and is expanding its reach into the community, partnering with more than a dozen local businesses including a nearby animal shelter, the library, food pantry and chain retail stores, like Target, Walgreens, Staples and Smart & Final. Our students, who practice pre-job training skillsets on campus, are accompanied by a job coach to help them navigate the workplace setting.

Expanding Interventions in the Classroom

The Help Group proudly partners with the USC Mrs. T.H. Chan

Division of Occupational Science and Occupational Therapy, through its **Help Group - USC Occupational Science Initiative.** The initiative is dedicated to developing evidence-based intervention programs for children with autism spectrum disorder through the guidance of an interdisciplinary team of researchers, educators and clinicians. Each year, Occupational Therapy Doctoral students from USC transform research into intervention in Help Group classrooms, by developing and implementing a therapeutic curriculum to foster growth and progress for young people with autism and other sensory challenges.

The Help Group - UCLA Neuropsychology Program, established in 2000, provides comprehensive assessment, testing and diagnosis for children with developmental challenges as well as family conferencing and follow-up services. It also trains post-doctoral fellows from UCLA's Medical Psychology Assessment Center in pediatric neuropsychology.

Learning and Professional Training Opportunities

The Help Group has long been a hub of special education resources and a model school and vocational education program that attracts the international special education community.



In the fall of 2023, **Cal State LA's Special Education Program** in partnership with a delegation from South Korea visited The Help Group. Comprised of school educators, social workers and vocational education instructors, the delegation toured our campuses, observing first-hand school, vocational and residential programs for youth with special needs and took part in a best practice special education lecture.

Help Group administrators offered expertise on the range of services The Help Group provides to help young people with a variety of special needs achieve and learn. Explaining that there's not a "one size fits all" approach, it's about an education tailored to meet the needs of individual learners and providing the opportunities to help them make progress academically, socially and with the vocation and life skills needed for post high school transition and beyond.

South Korean delegators acquired a framework for how best to design quality special education curricula and adapt instructional and service delivery for the benefit the students and families they serve and their broader special education networks in South Korea.

Ensuring Best Practices for Future Psychologists

The Help Group is committed to increasing access to evidence-based, clinical care for students through the robust training of next generation clinicians. The Help Group's full-time APA-accredited Doctoral Internship in Health Service Psychology attracts highly competitive applicants from across the U.S. Each year, five interns are selected from more than 150 applicants to participate in and learn from our multi-disciplinary staff of experts.

The overarching goal of the internship year is to become more skilled in the breadth and techniques of assessment and intervention with children, adolescents and families. Emphasis is placed on exposure to the varied roles a psychologist plays in a large community-based mental health agency—from program development to outcome evaluation. We are excited each August as we welcome our new cohort and know they will leave at the end of the year prepared to share their newfound knowledge in settings across the country.

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a developmental disability that can cause a wide range of social, communication and behavioral challenges. Once thought to be rare, the prevalence of autism has skyrocketed in the past 20 years. In the late 1990's, it was estimated that ASD occurred in approximately 1 in every 10,000 children. By 2004 that number had jumped to 1 in 250 children and in the beginning of 2023, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) reported the prevalence of ASD in the United States to be 1 in every 36 children.

At The Help Group we are often asked if this increase is "real" or a factor of better awareness and acceptance, leading to increased diagnosis. And if autism is truly increasing, what is causing this increase? We know that increased prevalence in autism has been influenced by greater awareness, improved expertise in diagnosis, and an expanded definition. However, it is unclear that these factors totally account for the increase.

One interesting, recent finding is that for the first time since autism prevalence records were kept, Asian, Black, and Hispanic children are now exceeding Caucasian children in diagnosis. This change likely reflects improved awareness of autism and better access to services among previously underserved communities. It also indicates that the prevalence of autism was likely underreported all these years in minority populations.

As the signs of ASD become more commonly known and access to diagnostic services increases, this will lead to more children (and adults!) receiving the diagnosis. But another factor to consider is that the diagnostic criteria were refined and broadened when the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual (DSM-5) was revised in 2013. Thus, while we know that we have gotten better at diagnosing autism, we have broadened the criteria for the diagnosis.

Researchers have also looked at the genetics of autism as it, and other neurodevelopmental disorders, tend to run in families. As of 2022, more than 185 genes have been identified as "significantly associated with autism." It has been hypothesized that the genes may be mutating as they are passed from generation to generation, leading to a higher occurrence of autism. It is also thought that the high number of genes associated with autism may partly explain the wide spectrum of symptoms and levels we see in autism. However, the exact role genetics plays in autism remains unknown.

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Ask the Expert

EPIDEMIC OR GREATER AWARENESS: What's behind the dramatic increase in autism diagnosis?

Finally, there have been several environmental risk factors that are thought to play a role in autism. Various prenatal and birth complications are associated with an increased risk of autism, including preterm birth, low birth weight and maternal diabetes or high blood pressure during pregnancy. Increased parental age at time of conception has also been associated with autism. Other complications that have been associated with autism include fetal distress, umbilical-cord complications, and cesarean delivery. Exposure to environmental toxins, including pesticides, microwaves and air pollution may contribute to autism.

In summary, more people are being diagnosed with autism now than ever before, which has raised the question of why? We now know more about autism and its various forms than we did back in the 90's, and as we gain more knowledge, we are better able to identify autistic individuals, which has led to expanded diagnostic criteria. Expanding the diagnosis in turn increases the prevalence rate. We have improved and standardized diagnostic instruments which has allowed clinicians to diagnose people of all ages more accurately. Autism advocates have worked hard to destigmatize autism, and this has likely led to more people seeking diagnostic confirmation. Greater awareness of autism, particularly the early signs of autism, has led to more minority and underserved children receiving proper diagnosis. These explanations all indicate that there may not be more autistic people being born now than in the past, but that we are better at identifying them. This idea, however, does not hold up to scientific rigor as the sole cause of the increase in autism prevalence. Research has also highlighted genetic factors that may lead to autism, in addition to potential environmental causes. Thus, the increase in incidence is most likely caused by a multi-faceted combination of gene mutations, environmental causes though no one cause has clearly been linked to autism - and a greater understanding of what autism is. The upside of all of this is that there are now better services, supports, educational and therapeutic programs available for those diagnosed with autism and their families.
